When reviewing a job offer, consider the entire package, including job content, salary, benefits, hours, flexibility, management and company culture, pension plans, and the work environment. If you're reviewing multiple offers and trying to decide which one to take, evaluate them both and compare to see which comes out ahead. In addition to salary, review the benefits and perks offered. Sometimes the benefits package can be as important as what you get in your paycheck. If you're not sure about the benefits that are offered, ask for additional information or clarification.

I would take the time to review the pros and cons. Making a list is always helpful. Also, listen to my gut; if it's telling you not to take the job, there just might be something there. Keep in mind that if this isn't the right job for you, it's not the end of the world. The next offer might just be that perfect match. It's much easier to turn down an offer than it is to leave a job that you have already started. The employer would prefer that you decline, rather than having to start over the hiring process a couple of weeks down the road if you don't work out.
