21. Kant would more than likely find homosexuality "wrong" for much the same reasons he considers theft "wrong."
22. Clifford suggests you aren't entitled to believe anything unless enough work went into it first.
23. One aspect of honesty involves having a conscience about what you believe.
24. One who does not tell the truth is always a liar.
25. Being 'sincere' merely means that one really does believe what one says, yet could also be perfectly mistaken about what one says.
26. The "lifeboat" movie was a good illustration of a 'utilitarian' problem with the fewest philosophical conflicts, compared to what might have been the case.
27. Kant would say the reason theft is "wrong" is because it is not rational, that is, the thief wants to make his behavior an exception to the rule he wishes to claim for others conduct.
28. If Mr. Holmes had been given command of a 'lifeboat' over-filled with infants, he would have faced even fewer problems than he faced in the movie.
29. Kant objected to the consideration of "conditions" when determining whether to keep a promise.
30. Honesty and sincerity are the same thing.
31. Mill thought a well-developed life might make it easier for that person to become 'unhappy.'
