

Mapping the Issue: Peer Review Prompt

Context/Thesis Paragraph: cite how the writer introduces or enters in the conversation? Cite the sentence(s) correctly. Meaning, use proper in text citation. Also, remember to unpack their quote (as in the quotation sandwich exercise). Lastly, before you wrap up this paragraph, does the writer include an I statement in either their introduction or thesis? If so, write the sentence in the space below. Remember, whenever you quote, you must cite the source and unpack the quote. This will be one paragraph.

Historical: Write their claim (writer's claim) that they use and do not forget to include an in-text citation at the end of the sentence. Lastly, unpack the quote in your own words: metacommentary.

Transition 1: Write their transition sentence verbatim and use an in-text citation when you are done.

Social: what is the writer's claim in the social paragraph? If they have more than one author or more than one source you may chose only one. As you previously demonstrated, use an in- text citation and then unpack the quote in your own words.

Transition 2 write verbatim and use in text citation.

Political: What is the claim the writer is making in their political portion of their essay. Do not forget to include the in-text citation followed by your metacommentary; unpacking the quote.

Transition 3: Type the transitional sentence and use in text citation.

Counter: copy their counter sentence(s). Use in text citation. Metacommentary.

Conclusion: HERE, THE REVIEWER WILL SUMMARIZE THE WRITER'S ESSAY.
