3. Title of the Study: Social Exclusion and Pro-social Behavior

RESEARCH PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. Purpose of the Study:
The purpose of the current study is to investigate the impact social exclusion may have on helping behavior.
2. Rationale for the Study:
Social exclusion is something that happens to everyone and therefore is important to study. In particular I want to study whether social exclusion makes people be less helpful. Also, no one has studied anything like this before.
3. Research Question or Hypothesis(es):
It is predicted that social exclusion will relate to helping.
4. Research Design:
Social exclusion and helping are the two elements of the research design.
5. Describe in Detail the Data Collection Procedure:
Data collection will be done on an individual basis. The researcher will go to the residence hall where all the residents will be present for a mandatory meeting. To be sure everyone is there, the researcher will arrange to have a list of all the residents' names. At the meeting, residents will first complete a demographic questionnaire. Several "dorm life" items ask things like which other residents they have complaints about, who they could kick out of the hall if given the chance, who is the dumbest resident, who is the ugliest

resident, etc. Afterward the residents will be told to sign the consent form. The resident assistants (RAs) and hall director will make sure the residents have filled out the form.

Next, the researcher will give the residents a cover story to hide the true nature of the experiment. Residents will be given a questionnaire about the facilities on campus. The questionnaire will include items such as the number of fire extinguishers, doors, bathrooms, computers, stairs etc. in their assigned area of the building (questions that necessitate being in the building). Participants will be individually assigned to unique areas around campus and told to return immediately to the residence hall with the completed questionnaire. A confederate will be waiting outside the participant's residence hall to stop the participant before entering the building. He/she will ask the participant his or her name to confirm it's the participant. The confederate will then identify him/herself as the "head of conflict resolution committee" for the campus.

The confederate will inform those in the experimental condition that the fellow students in the residence hall have reported the most complaints about him/her, that the fellow residents listed him/her as most ugly, dumb, and the person they most wanted kicked out. The confederate will also inform the participant that the hall had a recent meeting about the him/her and the general consensus was that he/she was not liked by anyone in the building. In addition, the participant will be told that the sentiment was so strong that they were getting kicked out and that all of their belongings could be picked up in the Residence Life office in another building. The participant will be told to head to that building to get pick up their belongings.

Participants in the control condition will be told by the confederate that a number of people in the student's residence hall have praised him/her and that the hall has a recent meeting about him/her and the general consensus was that he/she was liked by everyone in the building. The participant will be told that they are winning a "community citizen award" for being the best liked person in the hall and that he/she should go to the Residence Life office to get the award.

On the way to the Residence Life office, the participant will pass a table set up right outside the building with a sign and a clearly labeled glass donation jar attended to by another confederate. The confederate will tell the passing student that he/she is taking up a collection to fund students that need help buying books and ask the student to contribute anything he/she could spare to the fund. The confederate will take note on whether the participant donates and the amount of the donation, if applicable or if the participant gets physically aggressive (i.e. breaking the jar, punching a wall, getting in fight, etc.) since it is possible exclusion might make some people violent. If the participant goes to the Residence Life office, he/she will be debriefed about the study.

6. Plan for Data Analysis:
I will use Excel to analyze the data.
