Tab twice → The author of this article discusses the impact that texting is having on the social interactions of young people. He explains that this age group avoids face-to-face interaction, relying instead on the "smart phone or digital media player to connect with others who aren't nearby" (73). Furthermore, the author explains that electronic communication is compromising human conversation because people are much closer to their cell phones than they are to each other. As a result, young people are losing their ability to focus their attention on a single task or person. Goldsborough suggests that parents teach their children to engage in face-to-face conversation by establishing text-

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free zones and times. Although Goldsborough is a journalist and most likely not an expert on the subject, his reasoning is valid. He does not rely on his opinion but supports his claim with reliable facts and opinions from credible experts. He maintains objectivity not only by challenging parents of teenagers to set limits on cell phone use but also convicting older generations of the same detrimental actions more commonly seen in younger generations. I plan to use the information from this article to support my argument that texting has a negative impact on the social health and well-being of younger generations in addition to their driving ability and safety.
