

directly related to the way they function and has gleaned success beyond the efforts of other organizations in the area.

And, with regard to government entities, all of the typical challenges that have been well-documented and public policy literature apply. These may prove a hindrance to the adaptation of collaborative stewardship in governance.²

Nevertheless, given all of the objections, collaborative stewardship if executed even in only a few sectors of a jurisdiction should render greater impact for the betterment of those sections and that community than if there were no move in that direction. Hence it is worth the effort to attempt this strategy.
