It looks like you only have one primary source so far-- the Edict of Milan- which is fine as a primary source-- so either go into great depth analyzing this source or choose a few other primary sources to analyze dealing with Christianity in the Roman empire, see below:

A good outline overall, but remember that the focus of the paper should be on the primary sources— the paper does some of this, but make sure that the emphasis is on your sources (eg., the Edict of Milan). The paper should be more analytical than descriptive. Utilize and analyze more primary sources or go into greater depth with the sources you've chosen. The tonic you chose is fine and there are

The topic you chose is fine, and there are plenty of primary sources that deal with Christianity in the Roman empire in the Sources book (or other online or library resources that have primary sources) and there are many other primary sources in addition to those in the Sources text, so find and start analyzing more primary sources as soon as possible or go into great depth with the primary source you have (Edict of Milan). Be a little more analytical with the documents rather than descriptive or summative (show more of what the documents reveal rather than telling a story as narrative with less emphasis on the documents—in other words, focus more on actually analyzing the documents—the paper does some of this so far, but do more and see the summary v. analysis documents on

Canvas for help). Reorganize the paper somewhat to focus on the key ideas found in the primary sources themselves. Select and then look for ways in which the primary sources are similar to and different from one another and look for key themes and ideas. Reorganize the paper (not about events etc.) Organize the paper around the key themes and ideas (beginning with the paper introduction) found in your analysis of the primary sources--the introduction should highlight the key themes and ideas you've found in the primary sources you've chosen to analyze. Please work on this and develop your outline and your key ideas-- What do these documents reveal about the society (world) in which they were written? The paper so far is more descriptive than analytical, so focus more on an analysis of the primary sources

analysis of the primary sources you've chosen and less on describing them and analyze the primary sources in their historical context. As you write the draft be sure to use and cite sources. You cannot earn a passing grade unless you properly use and cite sources—whether you quote, paraphrase, borrow a key idea, or use specific factual information you must cite the sources you're using (primary or secondary sources). There are several citation styles you can use, but you must cite quoted or paraphrased material or specific factual information in order to earn a passing grade. The outline should be more developed at this stage-- including key ideas etc., found in the primary sources that the paper draft will develop. Finally, proofread and edit carefully, there are some grammatical and other errors. The

The main issue here is organizational and the paper's main focus-- begin with an introduction that notes your primary sources and mentions their key ideas that the draft will then elucidate and elaborate upon. See syllabus and paper assignment for clarification and you are welcome to let me know if you need help. You have the right idea, I think, but broaden the paper's scope, organize the paper, focus on analyzing primary sources, and edit and proofread carefully.
