The article discusses Australia's strict laws to control the types of guns people could own and require people to sell to the government any guns that were made illegal. It notes that data from Australia may be potentially valuable for understanding the effects of gun-control laws like in the U.S. where gun violence has become fairly common. It cites a study by Simon Chapman of Australia's University of Sydney which noted that Australia had no fatal mass shootings from 1997 to May 2016.

A quarter century, Australia passed strict laws to control what sorts of firearms individuals could claim. The nation likewise obliged individuals to offer to the administration any weapons that were made unlawful. From that point forward, Australia has seen zero mass shootings, another study finds. (Rosen, 2016).

Truth be told, firearm savagery in the United States has turned out to be genuinely normal, as per the Gun Violence Archive, a philanthropic gathering that tracks such episodes. Starting July 1, it had logged 163 mass shootings in 2016. Mass shooting tracker pegged the number at 208 for a similar period. Its numbers for June alone included 97 deaths and 213 injuries.
