The church receives no financial support from the government, and it does not engage in public education. Estimated 85 percent of those polled classified as at least nominally Roman Catholic. Christmas is a public holiday, and each year around Christmas and Easter, all education institutions in Mexico send their pupils on holiday.

Power Distance
