Possible thesis statements and thematic ideas for prompt - "Raisin in the Sun"

- Examine the play "Raisin in the Sun and discuss ways in which cultural, physical, or geographical surroundings shape psychological or moral traits in any of the characters. Then write a well-organized essay in which you analyze how surroundings affect this character and illuminate the meaning of the work as a whole.
- **Key terms** Cultural, geographical, psychological, moral traits
- **Question**: How does culture, physical /geographical setting affect the thoughts and morals of my chosen character? Choose a character and discuss how culture and moral traits affects this character and say how this brings out the meaning or theme of the story.
- Thesis: Walter is psychologically tired of his situation in life and aspires to do something differently in order to accomplish his dream.

- Discuss the first aspect of the theme by beginning with a topic sentence which generalizes about the
 theme
- Provide 2-3 quotations
- Explanation of the quote

Body Paragraph 2

- The second part of the body illustrates the next aspect of the theme as stated in the thesis.
- Provide 2-3 quotations
- Explanation of the quote

Body Paragraph 3

- Discuss the remaining parts of the theme's development in the last part of the body
- Provide 2-3 quotations
- Explanation of the quote

Concluding Paragraph

- Discuss and explain in detail the theme which was stated in the introductory paragraph.
- Topic sentence will clearly restate the theme, and the rest of the paragraph will summarize how the theme is revealed in the work and will explore its universal significance- how it relates to everyone's life because of the universal human condition.
