- She was the first black woman admitted to practice law in Maryland and through her legal cases helped destroy segregation.
 - She was the first woman to gain a recording contract with a major white label.
 - She was the first black doctor in the state of Georgia, although she was never allowed to practice medicine in the southern states.
 - She was killed by whites after having an affair with a white married man.
