

Peer Review: One to one and a half pages (or, 3 long or 4 medium length paragraphs)

Revision: Two to three pages, typed according to MLA format requirements, a Works Cited page listing the primary and secondary sources you used

Required Secondary Sources

Find one secondary source to support your point of view. That source must be derived from a print or online book, article, or essay, a blog, or an interview.

Assignment

Construct an essay in which you summarize an argument presented in our text, *They Say, I Say*.

Include in the summary of the argument what "I say," and what "they say," (terms editors use to refer to the two sides of an argument). Put another way, write a summary of the main point the writer is advancing and how (s)he supports his/her view. Then summarize the counter argument(s)--in other words what "they say" -- then mentioned in the essay.

Fully summarize the argument before transitioning to the part of the essay where you offer your own viewpoint regarding the topic that the writer explores in the essay you read. The discussion of your point of view must include a clear thesis (a statement of your main point), and support for your thesis.

Lastly, summarize the entire essay with a few sentences to create a conclusion.
