1. Write the correct MLA citation for the following book: the novel *Lord Jim*, written by Joseph Conrad, was published by Dover Publications, Inc. in 1999 in Mineola, New York.
2. Give five of the requirements for your essay (for example, typed double-spaced or written in ink):
3. Define *plagiarism*.
4. Explain why it is crucial that you identify the sources that you have used in your essay.

Answer the following questions based on the novel you chose to read. Use citations where needed.

5. Describe the major conflict of the novel you have chosen to read.

6. A. When and where does the novel take place? (If no specific dates or place names are used in the novel, what are two details which tell the reader approximately when and where the novel takes place?

B. How does the setting affect the story? Give two examples.

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7. Authors use literary devices such as foreshadowing, symbolism, similes, metaphors, personification, and allusions to enhance their stories. Choose two literary devices used in the novel you read. Give an example of each and explain how it contributes to the novel's setting or the plot.
8. Of all the ways an author has of telling us about a character, how do we learn about the characters in the novel you read? Choose one character and give two different examples of characterization. You may either describe two examples of what the author does or give two brief quotes from the novel (with citations).
9. What is the point of view of the narrator in the novel you chose? How do you know?

10. Different readers may place the climax of a novel at different points. Where do you think the climax is in the novel you read? Defend your position by using evidence from the novel.

11. Some novels may have a number of different possible themes. What do you think is the main theme or message of the novel you chose? Describe two plot actions that support your theory of the main theme.

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12. Question 12 is based on the specific novel which you chose to read. See page 358 of this study guide for a list of the questions for each novel.

It will be more beneficial if you type your essay and attach it to this exam. This will make it easier to proofread, edit and make changes to a longer essay; however, adequate space is provided on the exam for you to neatly write your essay. If you do write your essay on this exam, there is a space for a Works Cited list on the last page of this exam.

If you do type your essay on separate pieces of paper, be sure to put the name of the course and exam number (8) at the top of each page, followed on the next line by your name and student number. Double-space your typing and use a 12-point font with one-inch margins. You will need to use at least two outside sources with proper in-text citations.

Your essay should be approximately 500 words, which is about two pages typed with a 12-point font and one-inch margins.

There is a checklist for the essay on the last page of this exam. Be sure to review the checklist before sending in your essay and this exam.
